BEET SEED CROP FAVORED HERE

Oregon may become an important center of sugar beet seed production if test plantings prove as favorable as early trials have indicated, says G. R. Hyslop, head of plant industries division of Oregon State college.

With the development by the United States department of agriculture of varieties of sugar beets resistant to the curly top disease there has been a considerable expansion in sugar beet growing in the west, with consequent increased demand for seed. Those who are familiar with the industry believe that western and southern Oregon afford ideal climatic and soil conditions for the production of heavy seed yields with a minimum of expense.

In the colder sections it is necessary to grow the beets one year, take up the roots and replant them in the spring to produce seed. Preliminary trials in the southern Oregon branch experiment station and at Corvallis indicate that it will be possible to plant the beets in the fall, leave them in over winter, and harvest a good seed crop the following year.

In cooperation with the west coast sugar beet committee and interested farmers, the experiment station has established additional test plantings for the coming year in Linn, Marion, Clackamas, Washington, Yamhill and Klamath counties in addition to the trials being conducted at the branch station at Talent, Jackson county, and on the home station at Corvallis.

The fact that the United States imported 11 million pounds of sugar beet seed in 1936 indicates the future possibilities if the enterprise proves successful. Professor Hyslop pointed out.

Crop Price Outlook Not Good, Is Report

The outlook for field crops and vegetables in 1938 is not so favorable as in 1937, judging from information on probable production, consumer demand and farm prices contained in a report just released by the Oregon agricultural extension service.

The principal crops covered in the circular are wheat, feed crops, clover seed, hops, flaxseed, beans and truck crops. With few exceptions, increased supplies are in prospect considering both probable carry-over and new-crop production. At the same time, the demand situation indicates that the purchasing power of consumers will probably be lower in 1938 than in 1937.

Faced with the probability of reduced farm income, producers of field crops and vegetables generally are also confronted with the possibility of even higher farm operating costs than in 1937. These conditions are indicated by current data on relative farm price and cost levels.

The general level of farm prices in Oregon at mid-December is shown at 72 per cent of the 1926-1930 average, against 84 a year ago. Foods at wholesale are down five points compared with a year ago. On the other hand, the United States index of the prices paid by farmers for commodities is up slightly and farm wage rates 16 points higher, compared with a year ago. The exchange value of farm products is nearly one-fifth less.

The report contains several tables of data and graphic material

to provide background information for the commodity outlook sections. Citizens of Oregon who wish the information to assist them in planning farm production and marketing operations may obtain copies without cost from county agricultural agents or direct from the college.
