Guilbert, local clergyman who was appointed district cubbing chairman by Frank Van Dyke, who serves as chairman of the Ashland district committee of the Boy Scouts of America. "Mr. Guilbert is going to help us to organize cubbing in Ashland so that we might more fully serve the boy youth in our district," stated Van Dyke.
