40 HOPEFULS ANSWER SPRING GRID ROUNDUP

ALTHOUGH heavy weather and a heavier gridiron, ankle-deep from recent rains, threw the first week of spring football practice for "no gain" Tuesday and Wednesday afternoons at the local high school, Coach Skeet O'Connell said this week that he was well pleased with the initial turnout Monday, when about 30 future Grizzly pigskin aspirants and a dozen senior students appeared for practice.

Only fly in the ointment for O'Connell was the reluctance of last year Junior high school players to go to the trouble to work out.

"I know there are several good prospects among the sophomores," O'Connell said, "but there also are some good boys listed with last year's veterans and reserves who won't relinquish positions without plenty of competition. A good showing in spring practice will mean a lot toward getting a regular berth next fall."

Callisthenics, some passing and line-bucking and general limbering up made up the program for first-day practice. Later, plays and scrimmage sessions will be undertaken when the players are in shape to "take it."

Senior players, coached by Leonard Warren, will practice during most of the spring session with the prep regulars and will climax the work with a full-length game against the varsity. Compulsory practice for a period of three weeks is in effect for the graduating boys to protect them from the chance of injury. Jack Weaver, backfield, and Bruce Schilling, line, are co-captains of the seniors. Warren is a former star at Ashland high and enrolled at SONS this year. He assisted O'Connell last year.

Koozer Announces \$1 Bonus for Top Grade Tomatoes at Bagley

In an effort to stimulate production of better quality tomatoes in the valley, Ralph E. Koozer, manager of the Bagley Canning company, has announced that his company will pay a bonus of \$1 per ton for U. S. No. 1's and 50 cents per ton for No. 2's to all growers who produce and deliver a yield of 12 tons or more per acre this year. This bonus will be in addition to the regular contract price of \$12 and \$6.50 for No. 1's and No. 2's respectively.

Koozer stated that from experience it has been found that better quality tomatoes are secured from fields producing the larger yields and the innovation of a premium has been adopted as an inducement to better care and culture in the growing of this crop.

Business sessions, speeches, drill growers in the past have produced 20 tons and better per acre, it is believed that where proper care is given their crops and with a reasonably normal growing season, practically all growers will be able to reap the benefit of this increase for a 12-ton minimum yield.

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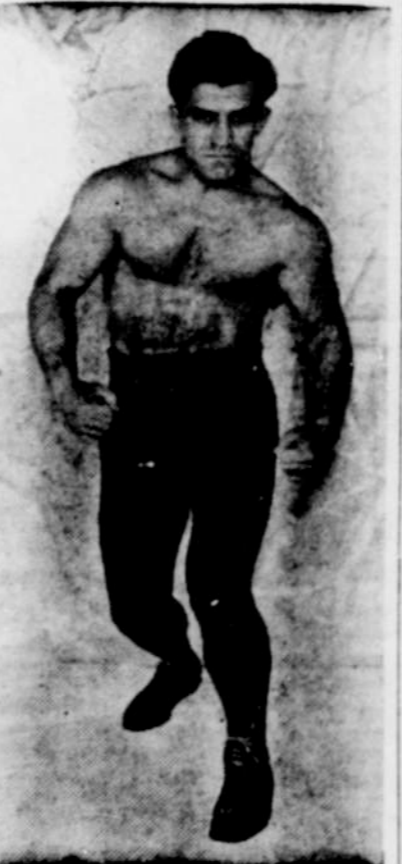


R. E. DIFFENDORFER
