the high school first downs came on a lengthy heave from Kenny Harris, fullback, to Joe Jessel, end, and another when Bob Gregory, little halfback, executed a beautiful reverse from deep in his own territory to bring the pigskin up to midfield immediately after the ball was put into play following the touchdown.

Senior scoring thrusts bogged down twice as other touchdowns seemed certain and the halftime gun interrupted another. Opening the game, the seniors kicked off to Ardie Warren, who ran the ball back from his own 20 to the 33. An off-side penalty set the Grizzlies back five yards, three plays failed to gain and Harris' kick to the seniors 30 bounced back on a bad hop to the 45. After the seniors were held on downs there was an exchange of kicks and Weaver picked up two yards through center. McNair then practically set up a score by slicing off-tackle to the high school five-yard marker but after the ball had been moved to within inches of the goal-line the high school line crashed forward to cause one of several costly senior fumbles and the grads were held. Harris kicked out of danger from behind his goal.

In the last quarter Weaver pushed the pill up to the three-yard line only to see it fumbled and the high school take possession.

Jack Forsythe, senior guard, provided one of the major thrills of the evening with a twisting, plunging 15-yard return of the second half kickoff through almost the entire Grizzly team to midfield.

Fans who saw the game predicted a better than average future for the O'Connell coached team. Lighter by nearly 20 pounds to the man than the more experienced seniors, the Grizzlies showed a remarkable ability to tighten up in the pinches and hold their opponents. Passes which failed Tuesday night will look mighty good with a little more practice and will stand the high school squad in good stead when they face conference opposition next fall.

Particularly promising was the work of Harris as a kicker and passer and Gregory and Jessel as receivers. O'Connell shoved Burnett, Hanel, Farlow, Leigh and several other substitutes in for his regular linemen during the fray without materially weakening his forward wall—the first time an Ashland coach has been able to do such a thing for several seasons.
