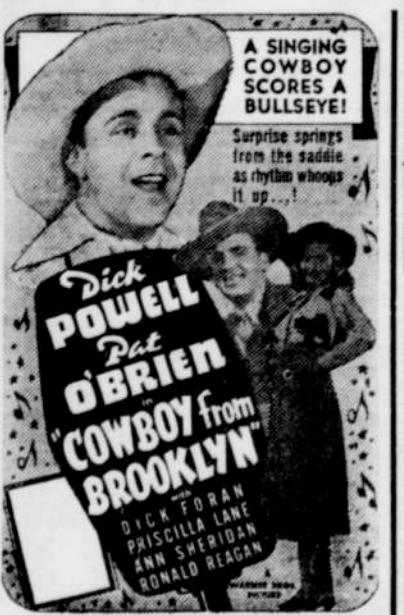

ALTHOUGH it starts in a western locale, "Cowboy from Brooklyn," coming to the Varsity Sunday, Monday and Tuesday with Pat O'Brien, Dick Powell and Priscilla Lane in the featured roles, is definitely not a western picture, for it takes nothing in the western scene seriously.

It is a hilarious tale of the complications which ensue when a New York theatrical producer, played by O'Brien, comes to a Wyoming dude ranch and assumes that a trio of stranded eastern musicians who dress up in cowboy duds while they en-

tertain the guests are authentic cowboys.

Taking the leader of the trio, played by Dick Powell, back to New York and launching him on a highly successful radio career as a cowboy crooner, he discovers his cowboy is really a Brooklyn youth who has never ridden a horse.

Music is plentifully interspersed with the action. Some of the music consists of famous cowboy ballads, but the real melodic feature of the picture is the five new songs written for the production.

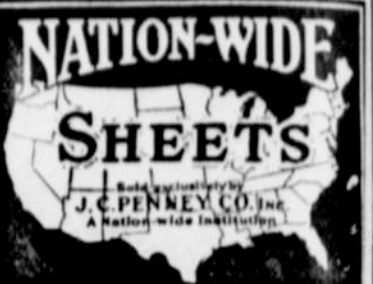
