(Continued from page 1) interest. We now hold \$110,000 worth of our own bonds. This means a saving of approximately \$5000 in interest to our taxpayers. Twenty-five thousand dollars of auxiliary water bonds will be callable this summer and we plan to take up these bonds at the earliest opportunity consistent with a sound fiscal policy. The assessed valuation of the city has been set at approximately two and onehalf million dollars for 1939 and the levy for the year will be lower than it has been for the past 15 years

Electric Department

The electric department has continued its successful operation of the past and each year this department contributes considerable amounts to the other departments of the city for necessary municipal services. For instance, \$10,000 was spent last year for the purchase of Pompadour mineral springs as directed by the vote of the people. Another instance is the replacement of the entire old wooden pipe line for the transmission of water from the Ashland creek reservoir to the Crowson hill reservoir by the installation of a new steel pipe line. The last mile of this improvement was completed in 1938.


