

Boy Scout Week Offers Tribute To Daniel Beard



More than any other man, 88-year-old Daniel Carter Beard has been the inspiration for American Boy Scouts, now observing their annual "week." Pioneer woodsman, artist, author, friend of youth, "Uncle Dan" Beard is the only man to receive the Boy Scout golden eagle badge. He is one of three men to be awarded the Roosevelt gold medal for distinguished service. Years ago, when the Scout movement struggled in infancy, Dan Beard was one of the men who got behind it and pushed.



Last summer's birthday party for Dan Beard at Suffern, N. Y., his home, was a tribute to the modern Scout's regard for "Uncle Dan." A human birthday cake, shown above, was one feature of the party. Mr. Beard was originator and founder of the first Boy Scout society from which the English scouts and others were modeled. Though many people forget he is an artist, "Uncle Dan" has done illustrations for many newspapers, magazines and books.
