Reduced Fares, All Expense Fair Tours Offered by Railroad

Reduced train fares to San Francisco, just announced by the Southern Pacific company, will make it possible for practically everyone in this vicinity to see the Golden Gate International exposition which opens Feb. 18, according to J. A. Ormany, general passenger agent, Portland.

The new fares go into effect Feb. 15, allowing ticket holders ample time to get to San Francisco for the gigantic opening celebration on the 18th. The round-trip coach fare from Ashland to San Francisco has been reduced to considerably less than two cents a mile. Tourist and standard Pullman fares are on a slightly higher basis.

Greatly simplifying travel to San Francisco are the economical all-expense tours which include round-trip rail fare, room in a good hotel, taxi transportation from and to the station, admission to the fair, a comprehensive tour of San Francisco—practically everything but meals.
