Ashland Unemployed Get \$2825 in Benefits In Month of February

Ashland claimants of state unemployment compensation benefits received \$2,825.62 through operation of the jobless insurance law during February, the commission's report disclosed.

The Medford office, which clears claims for Jackson and Josephine counties, accounted for \$20,183 of the state total of \$519,964, or 3.8 per cent.

February disbursements exceeded those for January over the state by 2 1/2 per cent.

The Portland metropolitan area dropped from 51 per cent of the state total to 47.6 per cent. Marshfield dropped two per cent, although retaining second place. Salem was third.

FARMERS GET CREDIT DROP

Southwestern Oregon farmers and stockmen had one-tenth of their interest bill for short term credit cut off this week as the Medford Production Credit association announced a reduction of interest rates from 5 to 4 1/2 per cent.

The new rate is the result of a like reduction in the discount rate of the Federal Intermediate Credit bank, Bren H. Starcher, secretary-treasurer of the Medford association, explained. Loans by Production Credit associations are discounted through the Federal Intermediate Credit bank. Both are units of the Farm Credit administration.

Reduction followed the sale of debentures of the nation's 12 credit banks at one of the lowest interest rates ever obtained by a private securities sale. The debentures are not guaranteed by the government either as to principal or interest.

This low rate, said Starcher, reflects the soundness of short term farm paper marketed wholesale through the credit banks.

The changed rate affects all business written on or after Feb. 24. In 1938 the loan volume of the Medford association was more than \$700,000.

"This is the lowest rate at which Production Credit has been available since the system was created in 1933," Starcher said. "Based upon the present volume of business, this increased reduction will result in annual savings of approximately \$800,000 to the 243,000 members of the 535 Production Credit associations in the United States.

"This reduction is in line with the policy of the Production Credit system to pass on to its members any savings that can be made. The reduction will remain in effect until changed by another revision in the discount rate of the Intermediate Credit bank, to whose rates Production Credit interest is geared.

"These loans are made for agricultural purposes and repayments are made at the time the member is best able to pay from the sale of crops or livestock or other operations financed. Most loans are made on the so-called budget plan in which members get a commitment from the association to advance them sums covering certain production periods, thus enabling them to have money when they need it without having to pay interest on the entire amount of the loan for the entire season.

"This is the basic principle of Production Credit: That money is advanced as needed, and that interest is paid on money only when it is actually in use."

The Spokane Bank for Cooperatives, another unit of the Farm Credit system, also announced this week that its interest rates on commodity and operating capital loans will likewise be reduced one-half of one per cent. Rates on these loans, like those of Production Credit associations, are likewise geared to the credit bank's discount rate.

Members of Ashland high school's basketball squad, Coach Skeet O'Connell's Grizzlies, early this week made their annual all-star opponents' selections. Picking outstanding players from all opponents, the Grizzlies named Monteith of Medford and Lanning of Grants Pass as forwards, Fletcher of Weed, center, and Rush, Klamath Falls, and Dully, Grants Pass, as guards.

In the southern Oregon conference circle, the Grizzlies favored Monteith and Lanning as forwards, Miller of Medford as center, and Rush and Dully as guards. In the district—which includes Ashland, Medford and Grants Pass—the local players replaced Rush of Klamath Falls with Kresse at guard.

Sportsmen Eye Three Lake Improvements

Meeting in Medford Wednesday night, members of the newly organized Rogue River Sportsmen's club voted to investigate ways and means of improving fishing conditions in Squaw lake, Fish lake and Lake o' the Woods, and three committees were appointed to look into the problems of each.

Objective of the sportsmen's group, as outlined at the meeting, is to develop fishing conditions in southern Oregon and to improve facilities where possible to offset the tendency toward retrimment of fishing privileges. Clearing of floating logs, destruction of fish infection, restocking and other improvements in the lakes will be considered.
