Small Fruit Outlook In Oregon Promising
Fewer acres of Oregon strawberries will be harvested this year than in 1938 although nationally an acreage eight per cent larger than last year is in prospect, according to the third recent agricultural situation and outlook report issued by the Oregon State college extension service. The report deals with small fruits and nursery crops and follows two former ones dealing with field crop and tree fruit outlooks. Any of these may be obtained from county extension offices.

Government estimates indicate 12,800 acres of strawberries for picking in Oregon in 1939 compared with 13,400 acres last year. The current acreage is 2000 acres less than the 1928-1937 average harvested acreage. Acreage of small fruits in the country as a whole has tended to increase slightly in recent years, but annual production has been greatly influenced by weather conditions, the report continues. With the present acreage and average yields, production of small fruits appears ample for all uses under current conditions of consumer demand. Berries in processed form are higher priced than such competing fruits as peaches, pears and prunes, hence are more susceptible to changes in workers' incomes. Red raspberries are next in importance to strawberries among the small fruits in Oregon, followed by loganberries, youngberries, black raspberries, blackberries, boysenberries and gooseberries. Since the time of the general census in 1929 the acreage of strawberries has tended upward, red raspberries have decreased, while black raspberries have increased. Youngberries and boysenberries together make up about six per cent of Oregon's small fruit acreage. Loganberries, blackberries and gooseberries have all tended downward in acreage since 1929.
