CENTRAL POINT DELEGATE WILL VISIT ENGLAND

IT is nearly a year since Mrs. Mabel C. Mack, Jackson county home demonstration agent, came from a summer study in the east, and had the first vague idea of sending a Jackson county woman to a great international conference of rural women in London this coming June. Immediately she talked over the possibility with the women of the county extension committee, the idea went over in a big way with them, and as a result it will be only a few weeks now until Mrs. A. T. Lathrop of Central Point will sail from New York as the delegate from this county to the assembly of the Associated Country Women of the World. The date of the conference is May 30 to June 10.

While Mrs. Mack was visiting in the east, she discovered that community workers in New York state were putting forth a big effort to send delegates, and she found that 44 states were represented in the 1936 conference in Washington, D. C., and that Oregon was not included. Mrs. Lathrop will be the sole delegate from Oregon.

Mrs. Lee Port of Applegate headed the committee of three women to lead the campaign work for a delegate. The other committee members are Mrs. Olive Floyd and Mrs. Rita Myers of Medford. Raising finances in these hard

times to defray the delegate's expenses was a big job, but little by little the money rolled in. Extension units sponsored dances and gave a luncheon, as well as sponsoring a magazine subscription sale. The extension committee sponsored a show at a Medford theater, and the approaching silver tea, and the recreation club sponsored a dramatic presentation. County organization, firms and individuals also contributed.

Jackson county's benefits from this project will be varied. Mrs. Lathrop not only will carry to England the story of this section of the west coast, but will be prepared to bring home information along the lines of education, agriculture and home economics. Mrs. Lathrop was born in England, received her education in Queens Wood College, London, and her degree from London university. In 1909 she came to America, teaching school in Montana. Her own children are now attending school at Oregon State college and from this background she will be able to make valuable comparisons. She is scheduled to talk at Pomona Grange in July, following her return from Europe.

Topics studied at the conference will include modern agricultural development, administration of health services in rural areas, handicrafts, training and work of rural organizers, women's place in the rural social order, and round table discussions of varied subjects. There will be a meeting on the rural theater, a trip on the Thames river to a garden party by Lady Astor, M. P., at Buckinghamshire, tea at Canterbury and a service in the cathedral.

The first meeting, which led to

organization of the ACCW, was held in London in 1929 under auspices of the International Council of Women. After meetings in Vienna and Stockholm in the next two years, during which a constitution was adopted, the fourth meeting was held in Washington, D. C., with attendance of 7000 women. Mrs. Grace E. Frysinger is the North American president.

Mrs. Lathrop will leave Medford May 16, going directly to New York. The day following arrival there she will join other United States delegates in visiting the New York world fair. After a tour of Greater New York she will board the Queen Mary for Southampton.

LAUNCH PLAN TO REVIVE MINING

In an effort to revive many old gold placer mines and develop a number of new placer locations throughout the west, the Mining Research Bureau, Pasadena, announces a new plan whereby it may be possible for a large number of men and women to cooperate in a gold placer project which may have operations in California, Nevada, Arizona, New Mexico, Idaho, Utah, Oregon and Washington.

The plan is to be completely financed by a group of public spirited men and women of Pasadena, Beverly Hills and Hollywood who desire no profit from the finances furnished and who are willing to appropriate the money required for the proposed plan of cooperative gold placer mining. It is estimated that 10,000 persons may be accommodated through the plan of operations whereby each person will be allotted a plot of known placer ground fully equipped with machinery to start operations. The persons operating these plots will be given gainful employment and an interest in the profits of the undertaking. The plan has received the endorsement of leading engineers and businessmen throughout the western mining districts.

In order to make proper selections and assignments of ground, the bureau will hold a series of public meetings, starting May 1, at which time complete details will be presented. Any community desiring to have a meeting in its locality should make immediate application direct to the bureau. Arrangements are also being made for the showing of the film, "Gold Placer Mines of the West," at all

meetings. Meetings are open to the public.

Commenting upon this Wm. Clay Barton, director of the Mining Research Bureau, Pasadena, says: "The pictures and lecturing the plan of operating placer mines, is the most suggestion for gainful employment made during the years. I urge every community to make immediate reservation of these meetings."

Residences.....	\$.50 a month for collection once a week during every month of the year except the months of June, July, August and September, when collections shall be made twice a week for a charge of \$.75 per month.
Stores	\$1.00 to \$8.00 per month
Meat Markets	1.00 to 5.00 per month
Garages	1.00 to 5.00 per month
Apartment Houses	1.50 to 8.00 per month
