PLAN 'JACKSON DAY' ON ISLAND

Selection of a date for Jackson county day at the Golden Gate International exposition has been requested by the Shasta-Cascade Wonderland association in communications to Ralph Billings and A. H. Banwell, Jackson county members of the Shasta-Cascade exposition commission. Sealed bids, marked outside "Bid for Timber", and addressed to the Chief Forester, O. and C. Administration, 410 Custom House, Portland, Oregon, will be received until 10:30 a. m., Pacific time, May 23, 1939 for the purchase of timber upon the tract hereinafter described; the cutting and removal of the timber to be carried out in accordance with the forest practice rules approved on July 7, 1938 by the Secretary of the Interior. Each bid must state the amount per thousand feet, board measure, that will be paid for each species or class of timber. No bid for less than the appraised value will be considered. Each bid must be submitted in duplicate and be accompanied by a deposit. The deposit must be in the form of a certified check on a solvent national bank in favor of the Chief Forester of the O. and C. Administration. The amount of the deposit will be computed at the rate of at least 20 per cent of the first \$1000 of the bid, plus at least 10 per cent of any additional amount of the bid in excess of \$1000 and up to \$10,000, plus at least 5 per cent of any additional amount in excess of \$10,000. The deposit of any successful bidder will be credited as a first installment in the payment for the timber. Checks of unsuccessful bidders will be returned upon the award of the bid. A bond will be required in an amount computed at the rate of at least 20 per cent of the first \$10,000 of the bid, plus 10 per cent of any additional amount of the bid in excess of \$10,000. Payment for the timber will be required in advance of cutting and at the option of the purchaser may be made in a number of installments scheduled to keep pace with the rate of timber cutting and payable upon demand from the Chief Forester. The successful bidder will be required, prior to the approval of the contract, to furnish a sworn financial statement showing ability to fulfill the terms of the contract.
