The public is cordially invited.

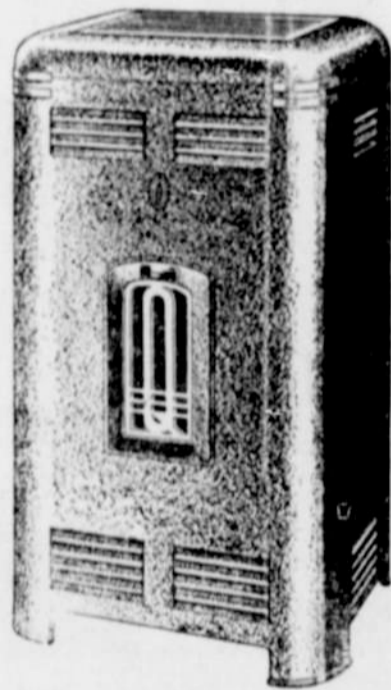
