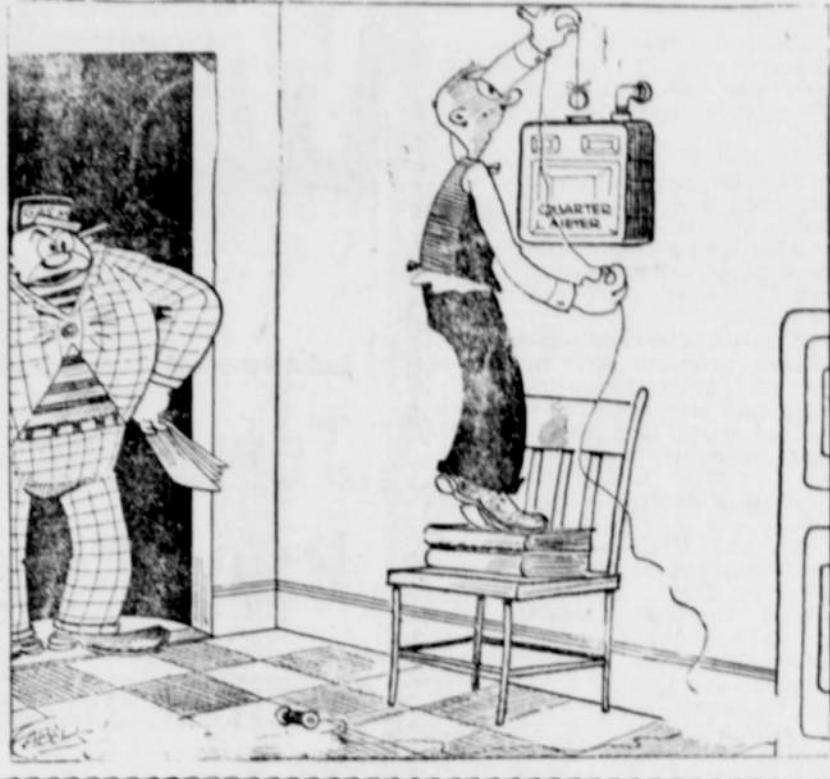

Good memory on the part of Bob Adler, president of the Crescent City Merchants, California entrants in the Southern Oregon league, has thrown the local baseball situation into a tangled mess.

Adler states that it was decided at a meeting in Ashland before the season started that the team finishing in first place would automatically be declared the pennant winner and the Shaughnessy playoff would merely extend the season and give fans more baseball. Adler consulted Austin Frazier, loop secretary, and Frazier remembered the decision at the Ashland meeting. So the four top teams are hard at work on the playoffs for exercise and, as aforementioned, the pleasure of fans while Crescent City appears to have won the title.
