




Striving to win the trip to the Pacific International Livestock exposition in Portland this fall, spon-sored by the First National Bank of Portland, 4-H club members of Jackson county are completing special projects and preparing entries for county and state 4-H competition. As for the last three years, choice of the boy and girl from each county in Oregon for this three-day visit in Portland will be based on outstanding leadership and achievement in 4-H

club work. According to local 4-H club leaders, the reports of last year's trip brought back by Marvin Poy-er and Betty Lue Reich, winners of the 1938 award from this county, have heightened competition to fever pitch. The trip includes daily visits to the exposition grounds, sight-seeing in Portland and special entertainment by the statewide bank, which pays all transportation and expenses. Last year 74 boys and girls of Oregon en-joyed this visit to Portland and the same number is expected this year.

H. C. Seymour, Oregon 4-H club director, again has been appointed general chairman of judging and awards. Local judges will be the county agent, county superintendent of schools and Eugene Thorndike, manager of the Medford branch of the First National Bank of Portland. 
