TO SURVEY SCHOOLS

WASHINGTON, D. C. — (Special)—Sponsored by the state superintendent of public instruction, President Roosevelt has approved as eligible for a WPA project a survey of all public school buildings in Oregon. Allotment is estimated at \$45,444. The survey will

inquire into the adequacy of existing school buildings, preparing maps showing the location of school buildings and what improvements are necessary.

OREGON CRANBERRY CROP IS DOWN IN PRODUCTION

WASHINGTON, D. C. — (Special)—Regardless of the shift in the date of Thanksgiving, and the experiments of the government to develop a turkey of 10 pounds which has more white meat than the general run of birds, the cranberry sauce of the Pacific northwest will come from the bogs of Oregon and Washington.

Department of agriculture announces that the cranberry crop of Oregon will be slightly smaller this year than in 1938. Similar announcement is made for the Wash-

ington cranberry production. Forecast for Oregon bogs is 7000 barrels and Washington 17,000 barrels, a decrease of 700 barrels for the two states under last year.

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
