Many Hear Talk On Science at Varsity By Missouri Woman

A lecture on Christian Science entitled "Christian Science: How It Meets the Human Need," by Elizabeth McArthur Thomson, CSB, of Saint Louis, Mo., member of the board of lecturership of the Mother church, the First Church of Christ, Scientist, in Boston, Mass., was given Thursday night before a large audience in the Varsity theater, which was donated for the occasion. WORN TIRE LAW GETS START IN PENNSYLVANIA

Designed to cut down traffic accidents caused by faulty tires, a new law pertaining to the condition of tires went into effect in the state of Pennsylvania the first

of this month, according to word received here by Earl Snell, secretary of state.

The law makes it unlawful for any person to operate a car with tires showing the breaker strip, cushion gum or fabric. Upon notification by a peace officer that his tires do not conform to state regulations, an owner is allowed 48

hours to make adjustments. Sponsors of the law believe it will reduce traffic accidents by eliminating many unsafe tires, it was said.

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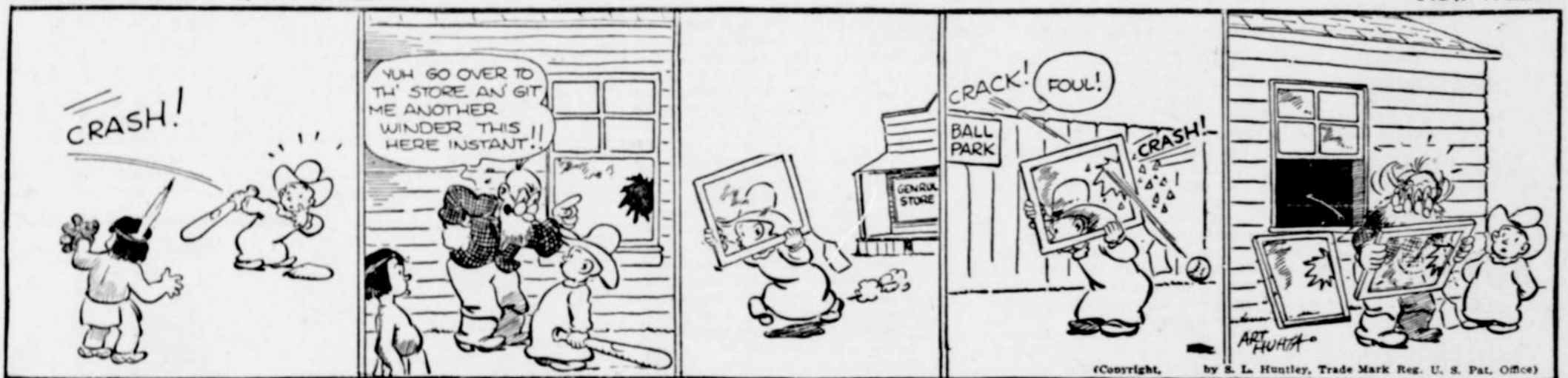
