Even though hazards have been checked, fires still break out. Here are a few common fires and methods of fighting them.



Kitchen stoves are a prolific source of fires—particularly when heating grease-filled frying pans. A close-fitting lid, clamped over the pan, will speedily smother flames, cutting off necessary oxygen.



An accumulation of rubbish near the furnace is always dangerous. Ashes, falling from the shovel, can easily ignite any debris. A pile of sand or water near the furnace is a necessary precaution.
