WAR HURTS PEAR SALES
WASHINGTON, D. C.—(Special)—Just as the pear growers of Oregon are confronted with difficulties in exporting their pears to European markets, the Argentine pears are coming into the United States. Duty on pears from Argentina is approximately 24 cents a box. Oregon growers are urging members of the delegation to see what, if anything, can be done about increasing that duty. Importance of the war zone market to American pear producers is shown by the exporting of 3,339,153 boxes and 713 barrels in 1938-39.

County Women Hear National Speaker On Educational Efforts

Explaining the policies and functions of the National League of Women Voters, Miss Constance Roach, national secretary of the group from Washington, D. C., spoke to members and guests of the Jackson county league at a special meeting held Monday afternoon at the Girls' Community clubhouse in Medford.

As a preface for her remarks, Miss Roach said that, strictly defined, this nation is a representative democracy and not a pure democracy. "To function as a representative democracy, the people must know what they want, must be free to express these wants and must be interested enough to express them," Miss Roach said. "Since a representative government must be backed by an informed public, the league strives to increase participation in government, to teach proper participation and to improve the quality of the electorate. Since this country has a tradition of lack of interest in governmental affairs, and of too much pressure by special interest groups, the league endeavors to counteract these influences to some extent by having a representative membership which promotes legislation only after it is thoroughly understood and legislation which it believes to be for the best interests of the most people."

In order to keep its membership well informed on happenings at the national capital, the league keeps a full time secretary stationed there. Miss Roach states that the league is the only women's group which does this.

Since international affairs are of first interest at this time, Miss Roach touched briefly on the foreign policy of the league. She stated that in the past the group had furthered legislation which it believed would promote world peace and at the present was in favor of repeal of the neutrality laws, with enactment of laws lifting the arms embargo and containing the cash and carry provisions concerning trade with belligerents. Miss Roach urged her audience to write their congressmen at once expressing their views on neutrality legislation.

Mrs. Leonard Carpenter introduced Miss Roach and announced the October general meeting to be held at 8 p. m. Oct. 16 in the Girls' Community clubhouse.

NAVY BLOCKING KOAC
WASHINGTON, D. C.—(Special)—Development of Tongue Point on Columbia river as a naval base for patrol planes is blocking increase of power of KOAC, the station of Oregon State college. Navy officers explain that the 542 kilocycles band wanted by KOAC is needed by the naval station at Astoria to contact the squadron of amphibians in operation. Representative James W. Mott, member of the house committee on naval affairs, has been unable to have the navy modify its position.
