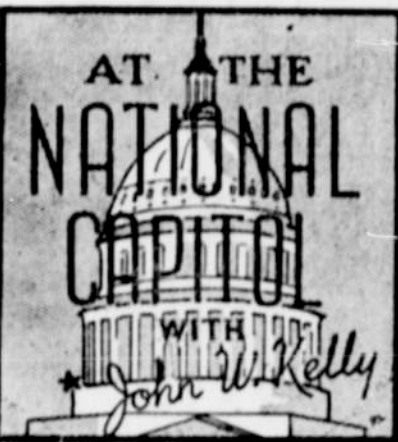
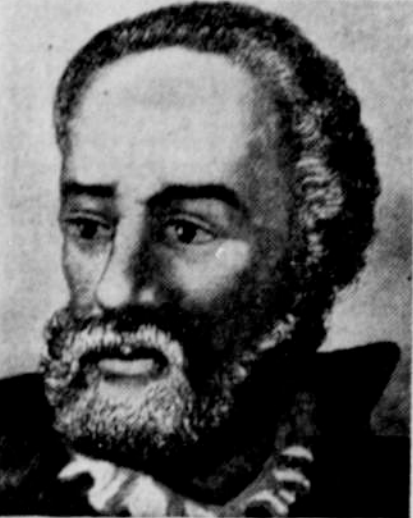


Meet Christopher Columbus: All 4 of Him

shelter (the old high cost of living); more employment, fewer people depending upon WPA jobs; better prices for farm products, grains, cattle, sheep; more young men joining the army, navy, marines, national guard, and becoming pilots; greater activity in the lumber industry; decrease in the relief load; fewer jurisdictional strikes; more vigorous action disturbing aliens not legally in the United States.

Vice President Garner has laid before the senate resolutions of the Second Oregon volunteer regiment, which served in the Philippines, favoring enactment of munitions of war by any private firm or corporation, and also favoring conscription of labor, property and wealth as well as manpower in the event of war. The veterans of the Spanish-American war likewise protest against the government issuing any more tax exempt securities, and demand that war debts due the United States by Britain and France be paid.

Notable progress is being made in the parole system in Oregon and Washington, reports a survey of the parole system throughout the nation. Oregon, says the document, "has been one of the most backward states in the matter of parole," but legislation enacted by the 1939 legislature paves the way for improvement. Of 38 jails inspected in Oregon, 28 were given efficiency ratings below 50 per cent, and the remaining 10 ratings not over 59 per cent.

Practically every lumberman and lumber exporter in Washington and Oregon is uniting in a position, or demand, that Pacific

northwest lumber have an equal opportunity with British Columbia in the British Empire markets. At present British Columbia has a virtual monopoly. With Britain looking to the United States for help, the time appears ripe to ask the British to suspend the preferentials given British Columbia.

Residential real estate in the Pacific northwest is active, states HOLC, and in the first seven months of 1939 construction was \$3,000,000 more than in the same period last year. In cities of 10,000 and up, residential construction was \$13,624,500.

Here is a bit of irony. It is the common belief of insiders at the national capital that President Roosevelt authorized Bonneville

dam as a favor to Senator Charles McNary, republican leader in the senate. When McNary returned to his farm last August he found that the Bonneville administration had cut a swath 100 feet wide through his walnut orchard and a grove of stately trees which were growing before the Pilgrims landed on Plymouth rock. The Bonneville administration purchased right of way for its transmission line down Willamette valley on the right of way of the Oregon Electric. Not wishing to build the transmission line through Salem, and instead of detouring via the state hospital and penitentiary, the engineers cut and slashed through McNary's timber and will run the line across the Willamette, then recross the river south of Salem.
