ASHLAND SQUAD OFF TO KLAMATH FOR TILT TONITE

THE Ashland High school football squad will travel again tonight for the third straight week when they journey to Klamath Falls to meet the Pelicans of Klamath Union High school on Modoc field at 8 o'clock.

So far this season the Klamath varsity has engaged in three games. The opener was against a mediocre Chico, Calif., team in which the Pelicans were held to a 13 to 13 tie. Next came Franklin high of Portland and a 21 to 21 standstill. The following week-end the Pelicans traveled to The Dalles where they were again tied, 7-7. The Wildcats, Klamath B squad, downed Lakeview the other night 7 to 0.

The Ashland varsity also has gone to the post three times, the first resulting in a 13 to 13 tie with Lakeview and the next week-end saw a 6 to 6 engagement at Yreka. The following Friday found the O'Connellmen at Grants Pass taking a 12 to 0 beating in a non-conference tilt.

Snowy Gustafson, the Pelican head coach, is determined to drive the tie jinx out of his charges at the expense of the Grizzlies and cautions that this week the reserves are making such a good showing that there is no such thing as a first string and it will be those who show the most "stuff" who get the call.

Gustafson's outfit is spiked by the little backfield star, Bobby Anacker, who was last season's sensation and has been the team's nucleus so far this year.

Skeet O'Connell, Grizzly mentor, has been holding extensive practice sessions all week and has ironed out some of the defects which appeared in the Grants Pass game. The Grizzlies are showing more pep and fire in scrimmage this week than at any time this season and the entire team is pointing to a decisive win over the Klamathites.

The last time the Grizzlies played on Modoc field was in 1937 when they played the powerful Pelicans to a 6-6 tie. Last year, however, the Klamath lads came to Ashland to administer a 27 to 0 lacing.

Starting lineup for AHS will include the following: Silver, right end; Hanel, right guard; Schilling, left guard; Gilman, left end; Warren, left half; Newbury, right tackle; Hawks, center; Brantley, left tackle; Rush, right half; Jandreau, quarter, and Bostwick, fullback. 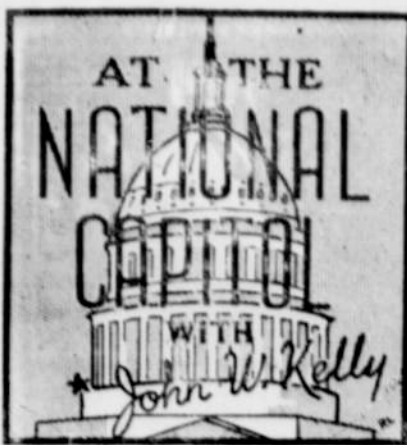

When the regular session of congress meets representative about will offer an amendment to the road act specifying that two per cent of the federal aid funds allocated to a state shall be used to acquire timber. The two per cent would not require matching. Hank member of the house committee on roads, Mott would become chairman in the event of a republican administration.

Here is something that doesn't make sense: According to newspapers, polls taken in the Pacific northwest show that 75 per cent of the people are for repeal of the mandatory embargo on weapons of war, but the ration of letters received by Oregon-Washington members of congress runs 80 to 90 per cent against repeal. Even dismissing the engineered propaganda, such as printed post cards, the letters run 65 or more per cent to retain the embargo. There is difficulty in reconciling the wide discrepancy. Polls can be and are juggled; the letters speak for themselves.

A government owned and operated plant to manufacture chemicals to destroy noxious weeds in grain fields of the inland empire is the purpose of a bill now in congress. It provides for a plant somewhere along Columbia river, using power from Bonneville, and the enterprise placed under the direction of Secretary Wallace of the department of agriculture. Hearings will be held in a few months. Author of the bill, Walter M. Pierce, is unaware that the measure has the unrelenting opposition of Secretary Ickes of interior department. Bonneville power is under control of Ickes, who is jealous of his authority, and whenever the name of Wallace is mentioned Ickes blows up.

Women will not be ignored in the census organization. Where a man is made supervisor of a district his chief assistant will be a woman; where a woman is supervisor her assistant will be a man. This information comes from census bureau after a state director had announced no woman would be employed in other than enumerator capacity in his jurisdiction. From a democratic party viewpoint, it is said the best fund raisers in the northwest were women, and they will be recognized.

While national guard quotas under President Roosevelt's executive order were quickly filled in Oregon and Washington, to arouse 552 young men in Washington, D. C., to enlist, the guard is staging a series of mock aerial and bombing attacks on the national capital. Bit of war hysteria.
