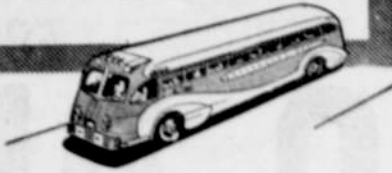

## CHRISTMAS SEAL MAILINGS MARK START OF ASHLAND DRIVE FRIDAY; MRS. LEEVER HEADS MERCY WORK

THE letter carriers of Ashland will become active messengers of health Friday, Dec. 1, when they start their rounds with letters containing Christmas seals for prospective purchasers.

Post office employees generally show keen interest in Christmas seals. About this time of year they watch letters for a sight of the first Christmas seal decorating the envelopes. And they usually recall that it was one of their number who originated the idea of selling an extra stamp to raise funds for anti-tuberculosis work.

"Every year," said Postmaster J. H. Fuller, "we feel we are taking an active role in the fight against tuberculosis when we start handling the Christmas seal mail."

Trying to calculate in advance how many seals various homes and individuals will want is one of the chief tasks of the Christmas seal committee.

"Some persons may want more than the number we send out to them," said Mrs. Earl Leever, chairman of seal sales in Ashland. "Others may want less, and in that case they are asked to return the unwanted number to headquarters. For those who desire to have more than we mail out, I can say that the committee cheerfully will send out additional sheets on notification, or users may make additional purchases at several booths that will be set up in the near future."

"Distribution and purchase are greatly simplified by this method of mailing out the seals. The addressed return envelope is a convenience to the purchaser. The public has never failed to cooperate in this annual campaign against tuberculosis and the committee is confident that there will be no letdown this year."

"Buy your seals now and use them early. Be among the first to put these decorative stamps on your regular mail," said Mrs. Leever, who explained that boxes will be placed in the McNair, Ingle and Broadway drug stores for the convenience of those who do not wish to mail in their remittances. Return envelopes included with the seals may be dropped into the convenient boxes instead of being mailed, saving the purchaser the trouble of obtaining a stamp.

Mrs. Leever, general chairman for the seal drive in Ashland, announced committee members as follows: Mrs. DeLo Provost, chairman of seal sales in public schools; Mrs. R. E. ## OREGON OUTLOOK ON FARM INCOME BETTER FOR 1940

Despite some expected increase in farm costs, most farm families in Oregon will have somewhat larger incomes and purchasing power in 1940 than in 1939, according to a review of the general farm income and cost outlook just published by the OSC extension service. "It does not seem probable, however," says the report, "that the average will be as high as in 1937, and some farm families may have even less income than in 1939."

This general outlook assumes that farm production will be maintained at about the 1939 level, that the European war will last at least a year and that domestic industrial activity and consumer purchasing power will average higher for the year 1940 than for the whole of 1939, even though some recession from current levels might occur.

Higher prices are expected for farm machinery, building materials, fertilizer, most seeds, motor fuel and oil, tires, binder twine, spray material and harness. Feeds may not rise much above current levels. Farm wage rates are expected to advance and farmers will borrow more money and pay more interest. Farm family living expenses will increase somewhat.

The improvement in farm prices and income in 1940 is likely to be greater for meat animals, dairy products, poultry and some vegetables and fruits than for wheat and some other staple crops. Prices for hogs will be affected by increased production, but export demand for pork and lard is expected to increase considerably on account of the war.

Foreign demand for certain canned and dried fruits may be greater, but export demand may be less for fresh fruits and possibly wheat. Much depends upon the course of events such as the effectiveness of blockades against shipping and governmental control over commerce. Unquestionably, foreign demand will be curtailed for luxury products and bulky commodities, generally.
