● Mrs. Ella True returned this week from Woodburn, Ore., where she has spent the holidays visiting with relatives.

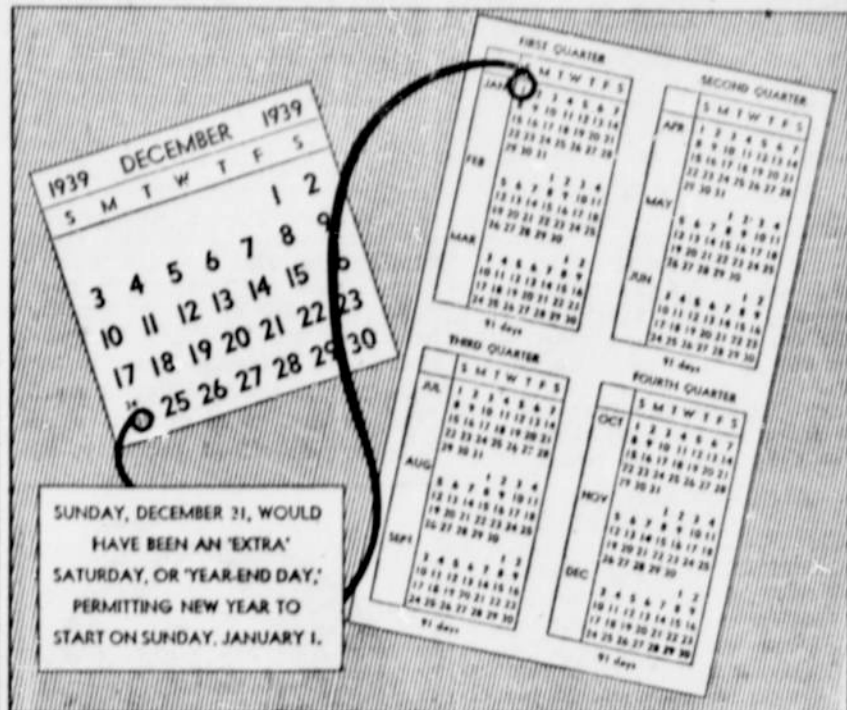
