The tourney champions will receive an intramural watch-fob medal award.

As soon as the basketball meet is over, six-man football will get under way, weather permitting. An effort will be made to have four teams play a single round robin with regular equipment to be furnished the players.

Noted Professor to Speak to Educators In Ashland Nov. 2

It was announced here today by Dr. Walter Redford, president of the Southern Oregon College of Education, that Dr. H. B. Bruner, professor of education at Teachers College, Columbia university, has been secured for a one-day conference on Saturday, Nov. 2. Dr. Bruner is a well-known authority on the school curriculum and curriculum problems and will conduct three different meetings on Saturday, Nov. 2, at the Southern Oregon College of Education.

Teachers, principals, superintendents and county school superintendents are invited to attend this one-day conference. The Saturday morning session will begin at 10 a. m. and the afternoon session will begin at 2 p. m. Both of these sessions will deal with curriculum problems of special interest to teachers and will be held in the auditorium of the administration building of the college. The evening meeting will be scheduled for 6:30 p. m. as a dinner meeting, and Dr. Bruner will speak to those individuals actually engaged in teacher education and teacher supervision work.

Poyer Gains Unusual Success With Cattle

Gaining outstanding recognition for his breeding of Jersey cattle, E. B. Poyer of Ashland already has made his score towards qualifying for a Constructive Breeders' award from the American Jersey Cattle club, from which he has received a number of coveted breeding awards.

During recent months Poyer, who besides being a dairyman here also is the democratic nominee for county commissioner, has received silver medal awards on his Sybil Della, which produced 601.25 pounds of butterfat in 305 days. The cow is four years, two months old, while a one year 11-months old Lady May Trixy qualified for the award by producing 635 pounds of butterfat in 360 days. The latter bovine missed a gold medal award by 10 pounds.

The awards, which are made from New York City, also included five registers of merit for five other cows in the Poyer herd.

According to Simpson, Ashland appeared to have no fight in the first half and blocking and tackling was poor as Medford ripped off long gains around end and through the line. But in most of the third and fourth quarters, the local boys began to fight and had things just about their own way. Ashland was well on the way to another touchdown with the ball on the Medford 30 as the gun sounded to end the game.
