Tippling Drivers Top List of License Losers

A total of 739 Oregon drivers lost their licenses through revocations as a result of convictions for driving while intoxicated during the first nine months of 1940, it was announced today at the office of the secretary of state. This is an increase of 30 percent over the revocations for the same offense during the first nine months of 1939 when the total was 565.

Under Oregon law, revocation of the license of a driver convicted of driving while under the influence of intoxicating liquor is mandatory and the driver is eligible for reinstatement at the end of one year providing he can file proof of financial responsibility, which must be maintained for the ensuing two years.

Nominee Schuler Tells Background for Co. Judgeship Candidacy

I. E. Schuler, democratic nominee for county judge, in response to a query, explained background of his candidacy for Miner readers this week in the following statement:

"I was born in North Dakota 55 years ago on a farm and lived there until I was 19 years of age. Having hardly an eighth grade education, I decided that I wanted to go to college. From that time on I worked my way through preparatory school and university. I received the degree of BL in South Dakota and MA degree at the University of Minnesota, then another year at Northwestern university.

"I then taught history and debate at Hamlin university in St. Paul, Minn. During the World war I served as welfare officer on transports crossing the Atlantic eight times. Coming to Medford in 1920, I taught history and civics in Medford high school for one year before going into business.

"I have built five buildings in Medford and have paid as much as \$3500 a year in taxes. I know the problems of taxpayers. I have served as chairman of the budget committee of the city of Medford and the experience I have had in construction work should enable me to give a good business administration.

"My experience in the classroom with girls and boys and my scoutmaster's work in the city of Minneapolis have given me a wide understanding of juvenile problems. I will support old age pensions, whenever possible, and work diligently for welfare and health organizations. I am married and have one child; am a member of the Episcopal church."

State Banking Board Asks Voter Approval Of 'Liability' Change

The state of Oregon banking department this week urged approval by voters of an amendment to remove the double liability of stockholders in state banks in the following letter and statement to The Miner. Said A. A. Rogers, superintendent of banks:

"Enclosed you will find statement of the state banking board of Oregon on one of the constitutional amendments referred to the people by the 1939 legislature.

"Oregon is one of the six remaining states which has not relieved stockholders of the state chartered banks of the double liability on stock owned by them, and, due to this provision, applications for the organization of state banks at several points entitled to banking facilities have been retarded until after the November election."

The state banking board's formal statement, signed by Charles A. Sprague, governor; Earl Snell, secretary of state, and Walter E. Pearson, state treasurer, is as follows:


"Your state banking board is convinced that the proposed amendment for the removal of the double liability on the stock holders of a part of our state banks should be adopted. Since deposits in our state banks are insured, double liability is a needless and outmoded provision.

"National banks have been relieved of this obligation and its continuance on state banks put the latter under a serious competitive handicap. Its removal would assist in the growth of the state banking system which we feel is needed in the sound development of the state."
