Mrs. Walker Named To Head Christmas Seal Sale in Ashland

Mrs. R. E. Walker has accepted the post as chairman of the 1940 Christmas Seal campaign of Ashland, it was announced today by Miss Helen Bullis, president of the Jackson County Tuberculosis association. Mrs. Walker is choosing her committee members and plans for the entire drive will be completed shortly.

Campaign material has already arrived at the association's headquarters, Mrs. Walker said, and an early start on preparations for mailing is assured. The campaign opens Nov. 25.

"Ashland, like all other communities, has its tuberculosis problem," said Mrs. Walker, "and at least once a year we should intensify our efforts to help solve the problem.

"Tuberculosis still leads causes of death in this country for persons between the ages of 15 and 45. This will be the 34th Christmas when voluntary workers have cooperated with state and local tuberculosis associations to raise funds to carry on the nation-wide campaign against the disease.
