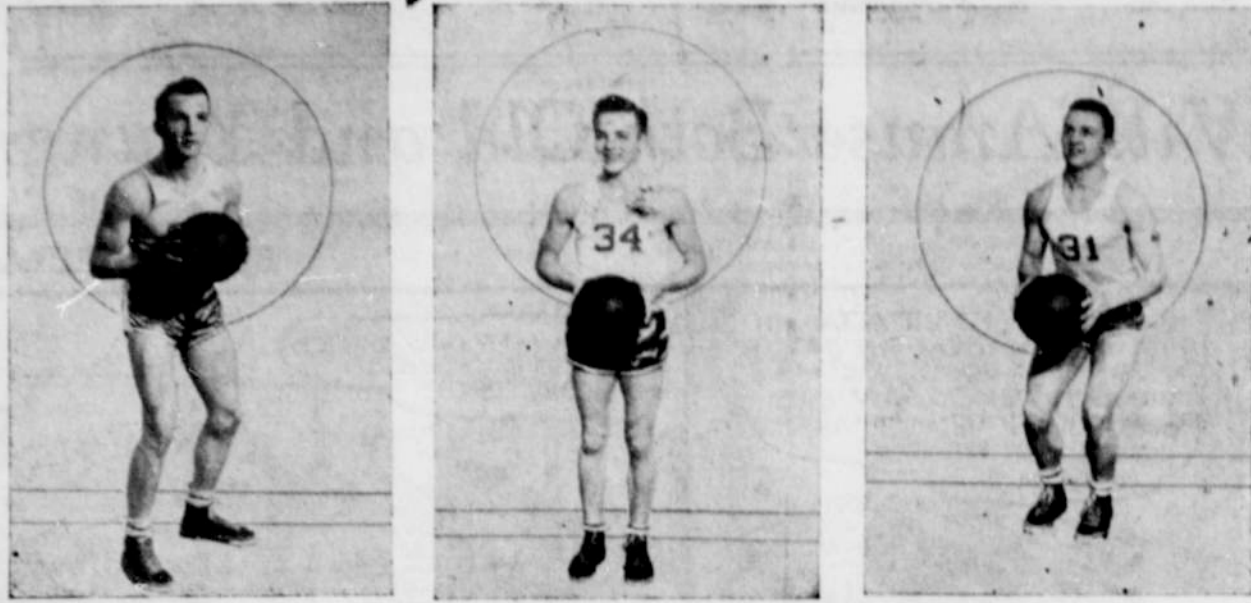

Soil Improvement Is Short Course Topic

A three-day annual soil improvement short course at Oregon State college has been set for Thursday, Friday and Saturday, Jan. 30 to Feb. 1, announces W. L. Powers, head of the soils department. While the program for the course has not been completed, acceptances have been received from a number of out-of-state speakers who will join with specialists on the experiment station and extension service staff in handling the lecture and demonstration work.

The first day of the course will be devoted to soil surveys, land classification and land use. The second day will be confined largely to consideration of reclamation problems, including irrigation, drainage, and flood and erosion control. The final day will be devoted to discussion of soil fertility and the use of commercial or other fertilizers.

Roseburg Wins Over AHS IN Torrid Battle

A powerful and well-coached Roseburg Indian basketball team took the measure of the heretofore unbeaten Ashland high Grizzlies 40 to 36 at Roseburg Tuesday night. The game was faster than most college contest throughout the entire 32 minutes.

Charley Jandreau, diminutive forward, paced Ashland's attack and score 14 points and was aided with 10 by Provost, Smith with nine and three by Monroe. Fowler and Weaver failed to score but turned in a whale of a game just the same.

The locals weren't behind all the time, however, for they held a commanding 12 to 5 lead at the end of the first period but had slipped to only a 17-16 margin at halftime. Roseburg forged ahead at the three-quarter mark and was out in front 31 to 26.

Ashland suffered innumerable traveling penalties which cost them possession of the ball and had many fouls called on them. The two teams clash here tonight.

GRIZZLIES TOP GEEPEE 28-16 AT JAMBOREE

Ashland high's Grizzlies won their first conference basketball game at the second annual jamboree held at the junior high gym Friday night when they tripped a close-checking Grants Pass outfit to the tune of 28 to 16.

Both teams, Ashland in particular, missed enough shots to win a dozen ball games. The Grizzly floor play was something to watch both on offense and defense but the Gastineau club faltered under the hoop.

Bud Provost collected 12 points to lead all scorers, with Bob Weaver second with seven.

The Grizzlies led all the way, being out in front 3-0 at the end of the first period and 12 to 5 at the half. They led 18 to 11 at the end of the third quarter.

Davis led the Cavemen scoring with six markers.

Al Simpson's junior high team was too small and inexperienced to cope with a bigger Roseburg junior high five and dropped the preliminary game 25 to 19. Dick Kerr, local junior, contributed two points to the cause for Roseburg when he became confused as to which way his team was going and sank a beautiful shot for his opponents. Little Jay Samuelson played a whale of a game for Ashland and led his team's scoring with seven. Vincent, Roseburg center, was high for the game with eight.

The Grants Pass drum and bugle corps, Ashland girls' drill team, and Ashland Downtown Quarterbacks provided entertainment along with the junior high band.
