Court Orders Ashland Pair Held 90 Days

James Potter and Lee Wyatt Davis, Ashland youths, who recently were arrested with Robert Johnson of Emmett, Ida. for the armed holdup of a service station near Gold Hill, are to be held in the county jail for 90 days for observation before the court will make final disposition of their cases.

Johnson, oldest of the trio, was sentenced to an indeterminate prison term not to exceed 10 years, by Circuit Judge H. K. Hanna. Leniency was asked in behalf of the Ashland boys because of their youth, both of them being under 18 years of age.

So many Ashland basketball fans are wondering what the possible outcome of the district tournament basketball race can be that Hindsight has added a few gray hairs in figuring it out.

The present league standings follow:

Medford	6	4	.600
Grants Pass	0	11	.000

Ashland plays Grants Pass there next Tuesday night and Medford here Feb. 28. Roseburg meets Medford at Medford tonight. These are the remaining games yet to be played in the district. If Ashland wins both of these and Medford beats Roseburg, Ashland will win the title and the right to play at Salem in the state tournament with a percentage of .750. Roseburg will be second with .667 and Medford will hold third place with .583.

But if Ashland loses to Grants Pass and Medford and the Tigers win over Roseburg, Medford and Roseburg will be tied for top honors with .667 and Ashland will have second place with .583.

If Ashland wins the two remaining games and Roseburg beats Medford, Ashland and the Indians will have a mutual claim for the championship and Medford will be in second place with .500.

The other possible consideration is that Ashland beats Grants Pass and loses to Medford and Medford beats Roseburg. In this case there will be a three-way tie with Ashland, Medford and Roseburg having a percentage of .667.

Grants Pass, having not won a conference game to date, is out of any possible consideration.

LAST MINUTE TOSS DECISIVE

Before a capacity crowd that crammed the Medford high school gymnasium to the rafters and made the place a virtual madhouse with shouts of enthusiasm, Medford high stole a 34 to 32 basketball victory from the league-leading Ashland Grizzlies Tuesday night. The loss put Ashland into second place with Roseburg now in front and Medford in third position.

The Tigers had to come from behind to turn the trick and were on the short end, 24-17, at the half. The Grizzlies were in front 14-10 at the end of the first period and the score found them leading at the three-quarter mark, 30 to 25.

Medford's defense tightened up in the fourth quarter to the extent that a field goal by Bob Weaver was the only Grizzly tally. The Ashlanders were literally run to death in the final period and slowly but surely Medford edged up to where Fred Gunnette took a pass from Lee Reynolds and tied Ashland at 30-all. Weaver took the ball under his own basket and dribbled the length of the floor to sink one from the key hole to put the Grizzlies in front. Then, with five seconds to go, Gunnette cut in from the corner to take a beautiful pass and sink a close one.

Weaver made a desperate attempt to tie the ball game when he fired away at the basket from about three-quarters of the way down the floor but the ball was wide of its mark.

Jandreau and Weaver tied for high honors of the game with 10 points apiece and Gunnette and Harold Fawcette were top scorers for Medford with eight each.

GAME COMMISSION REPORTS FISH SEASONS AND LIMITS

Flores lake and Garrison lake; in that portion of the same creek (same county) from its mouth upstream to the old highway bridge; in Clackamas river, from its mouth to river mill dam, exclusive of its tributaries; in Bull Run river from its mouth to a point 300 feet below the powerhouse, exclusive of its tributaries; in that portion of fifteen mile creek from a point 200 feet above Sevier dam to its confluence with eight mile creek; in the Sandy river from its mouth to Sevier dam, exclusive of its tributaries; in the North Umpqua river from its mouth to the narrows, exclusive of its tributaries; and in the South Umpqua river from its mouth to Jackson creek, exclusive of its tributaries.

Bag limit for trout over 10 inches in length in the foregoing described waters during the period from Jan. 1, 1941 to April 1, 1941, both dates inclusive, shall be three such fish in any one day but not more than six such fish in any seven consecutive days. The general bag limit for trout shall apply otherwise.

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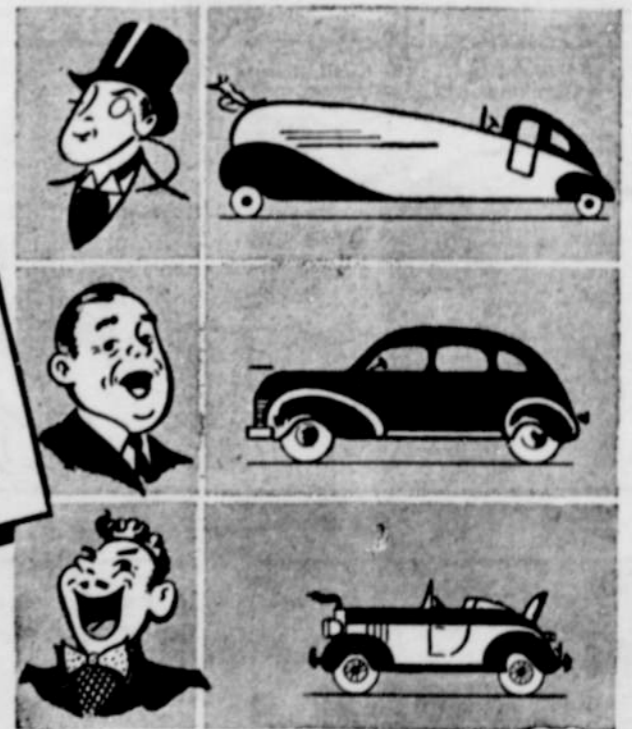
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
