### Prizes Offered For Fire Control Slogans

The state has been divided into eight districts, with a \$5 cash prize offered in each and a \$10 grand prize. Each slogan is to carry a message about protecting forests from their worst enemy, fire. Each student may submit one slogan, which is to be submitted in his or her handwriting, together with name, date address, county, high school and class numerals. Slogans are to be mailed to the School of Forestry, Corvallis, Oregon, not later than April 28.

Medford's state league Craters are now holding daily workouts in preparation for the season which will open at Medford against the Albany Alco-Oaks. The date is set for April 11 but officials of the league have authorized Medford, Klamath Falls and Albany to shift dates to suit themselves and already negotiations are under way to move the Albany date up to the 10th, which will be Saturday night.
