HINDSIGHT ON SPORTS

Charlie Jandreau, the Ashland high kid who can play anything in the way of sports if given the necessary wherewith and a list of the rules, deserves a lot of credit for his stand in the Oregon high school tennis championships held at Reed College in Portland last week-end. Charlie got himself a berth in the finals by winning from Glen McIntosh of Corvallis in the semi-finals. In the finals Saturday afternoon, Charlie clashed with Monte Meyers of Beaverton, who was having a busy day dashing between the Reed College tennis club's annual Center tournament, also in Portland. Meyers defeated Jandreau in straight sets, 6-1 and 6-4, to win the high school championship and then dashed over to the Irvington courts where he defeated Bob Wolfard of Grant high 6-2 and 6-3 to win the junior men's singles title in that tournament.

Much credit is also due Jack Merritt and LaMar Ormond who lost out to Clyde Carstens and Paul Cacy of Roseburg in the finals of the doubles championship. The Indians were defending champions. Bud Provost, the other Ashland entry, did alright for himself until he was eliminated by Jandreau in the second round.

If Bob Considine INS sports writer, can be believed, and I Told You So has no reason to doubt his word, heavyweight champion Joe Louis showed his "colors" in his scrap with Buddy Baer in Washington last Friday night. After knocking Louis out of the ring in the first round and opening a bad cut over the champ's eye in the fifth, Louis won when Baer failed to come out for the seventh stanza.

Let us quote Considine, in part, "But hardly had the crowd begun to cheer his courage and when the gong ending the sixth round was still echoing through the place Louis, presumably on the way to his corner, turned on Baer, whose hands were down, and floored Buddy with a savage right to the jaw. The 237-pound Baer, knocked almost completely cold, hit the canvas with a splintering crash... Over this mad scene, made madder by the slobbering giant floun-

dering on the little stool in Baer's corner the bell which was to start the seventh round sounded wildly. Louis catapulted out of his corner full of fight and injured pride, but Hoffman and Klein (Baer's handlers) refused to get out of the ring or permit the injured Baer to arise."

It was here that Referee Arthur Donovan gave the match to Louis. Jimmy Sullivan, one of the two judges, stated definitely after the fight that the punch was landed by the titleholder after the bell had sounded. It's one way to keep a championship even though it is a heck of a poor one.
