# HINDSIGHT ON SPORTS

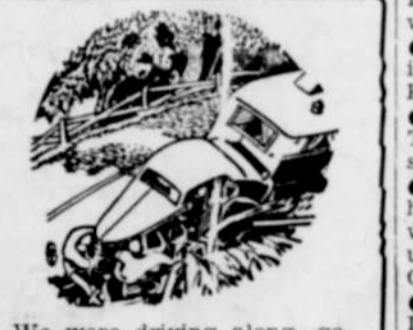

Miss Ethel Huber, whose talks have been heard on radio stations from coast to coast for the last several years, will speak at the Neighborhood church, Congregational, Wednesday, June 18 at 8 o'clock p. m.

She will review the promises made by those who sought repeal of the 18th Amendment, and discuss the manner in which these promises have been kept, giving up to the minute statistics on bootlegging, kidnapping, drunken driving, and liquor consumption since repeal. She also will have something to say about the revolting conditions in and around military camps where liquor is sold.
