Service Men Need Fishing Licenses

Men in military service who have been assigned to duty in Oregon may obtain "resident" fishing and hunting licenses after they have resided within the state for a period of six months.

Under the Oregon Game Code, a non resident is defined as a person who has not lived within the confines of the state for a period of six months immediately preceding his application for a fishing or hunting license.

Many men in the service have had the impression that they could legally fish or hunt without a license or with a resident license before six months' residence in the state, but the Oregon State Game Commission has no power to issue any special licenses for service men. If a man wishes to fish or hunt before he has lived in the state for six months, a non-resident license would be necessary.

For the benefit of persons who desire to fish for a limited time, a 10-day fishing license for non-residents is sold for \$3.

JERSEY CATTLE TOUR SLATED

A Jersey cattle inspection tour of Jackson county farms, sponsored by the Rogue River Jersey Cattle club will be held Saturday morning followed by a noon picnic at Lithia park. This tour and picnic conclude three busy days of meetings and inspections by the club.

Inspection tours began Thursday and will continue today of 4-H club Jersey calf projects. The committee making this tour includes C. J. Hunter, Bob Lytle, J. R. McCracken, all of Ashland, accompanied by Lawrence Francis, county 4-H club agent, and T. R. Warren of Portland, western representative of the American Jersey Cattle club.

A meeting of the Jersey cattlemen is scheduled at the court house in Medford at 8 p. m. tonight at which color movies will be shown of outstanding western Jerseys and the modern methods of milk production. George Riddle of Grants Pass, vice president of the Rogue River Jersey club, also will speak, telling of his recent attendance at the national meeting of the club in New York.
