Architect's Report On Washington School!

After considerable study of conditions at the Washington school, the school board announced last week that a public vote on a \$90,000 bond levy for the purpose of erecting and equipping a new school building will be taken Aug. 28. In order that the voting public may better understand the factors that led to this decision by the board, we are quoting sections from the architect's report made by Howard R. Perrin after a detailed study of the present structure:

"The auditorium on the second floor of this building should no longer be used as an auditorium. The floor system can be made to vibrate by the weight of one person, which bears out the facts discovered in section "C" that the supporting floor joists are inadequate to safely carry the imposed loadings . . .

" except in fireproof buildings, auditoriums are not allowed on floors above the first. (This is not a peculiar requirement of the Uniform Building Code, but is a requirement of all modern codes). Therefore, in order to use this auditorium after we had made it structurally safe, we should fireproof all the underside of the second floor. Stairways also should be enclosed in fireproof walls with openings thereto closed ple's meeting at 7 p. m. Evening worship at 8 o'clock. with fire doors."

... In section "C" we find that the roof construction should be reinforced and we feel that the exterior wall construction is not as good as it should be.

"The boiler room presents a serious fire hazard and should be enclosed with masonry walls having openings therefrom closed with self-closing fire doors. "The basement beams and girders will need addi-

"The building should be re-wired in conduit and ning. Evangelistic service to foladequate lighting provided throughout.

"Conclusion: A thorough job of remodeling must be done on this structure if it is to serve as a school building much longer. Such a remodeling job when

completed would cost close to \$40,000. "The building even then would have many undesirable features, and would not equal school administration standards. . . . The building is too wide and the window areas not properly placed to allow rearrangement into desirable and properly oriented school space It would therefore seem that it would be economy to plan on the erection of a new school building as soon as possible in order to eliminate the necessity of spending any money for remodeling or improving the present structure."
