## Another State Adds Nursery Agreement

Mississippi has notified the Oregon department of agriculture of a reciprocal arrangement which will permit Oregon nurserymen to ship into that state without securing permits or file duplicate invoices. However, a valid nursery certificate tag from Oregon must accompany the shipment of stock, and also firms shipping there should file with the Mississippi plant board a satisfactory certificate of inspection from the Oregon department.

State agricultural officials also report that Nevada, Idaho and Montana have ordered revocation of alfalfa weevil quarantines, effective Oct. 1. This brings to five to date the list of western states that have followed the recommendation of the Western Plant Board in this matter. Oregon and California were the first two.
