
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"JUNGLE LOVE"

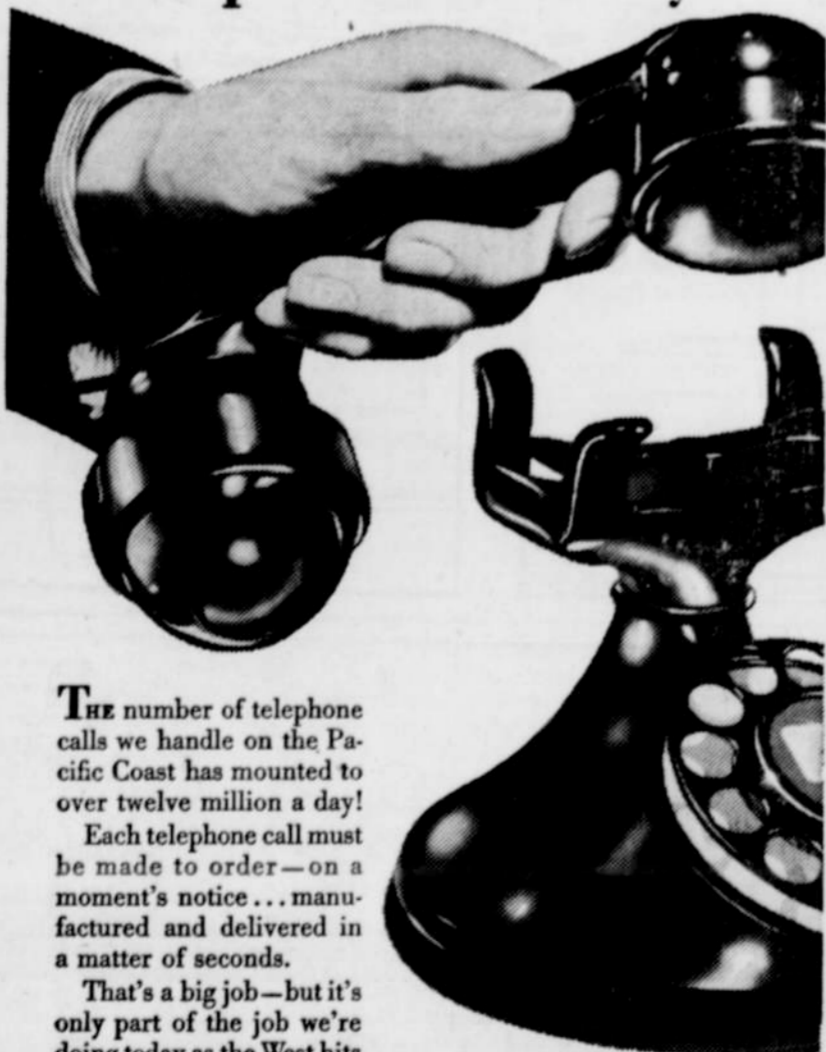
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SOCE INSTRUCTOR GRANTED THREE MONTHS LEAVE
