Death Calls Ex-Vicar Of Trinity Church

The Rev. Philip K. Hammond, former vicar of Trinity Episcopal church in Ashland, died last Thursday night at the Good Samaritan hospital in Portland after a long illness.

He was born in London in 1857 and came to the United States when he was a young man. After serving several other churches in Oregon, he came to Ashland in 1915 and was rector of Trinity church until his retirement in 1930. Rev. Hammond was very active in civic and fraternal affairs as well as in his church work during his stay here.

Survivors are his three sons: William of Oregon City, Philip of Portland, Ward of Medford; and a daughter, Mrs. Guy Young of Roseburg.
