

Medford Tigers, Coach Bill Bowerman's T-formation, is the scoring leader among unbeaten Oregon high school gridiron teams and the favorite for the Oregon high school mythical state championship, according to an Associated Press story.

The Tigers have amassed a total of 130 points in four games, an average of 32.5 a game. They have had 34 points scored against them. Hood River is next in line with 136 points in five games, an average of 27.2, and Myrtle Point, also using the T-formation, has a total 97 points for an average of

24.2. The Dalles is next with 83 points in four games, an average of 20.7. Milton-Freewater has a total of 101 in five games, an average of 20.2.

The Dalles leads defensive play, having but one touchdown scored against them for an average of 1.7. Hood River has allowed 28 an average of 5.6; Milton-Freewater 40 for an average of 8; Medford's 34 averages 8.5, and Myrtle Point 44, an average of 11.


