SONS ANNOUNCE **GAMES SCHED**



This new rule increased the number of conference games, making it possible for each team to play the other four times instead of twice. Included in this conference are Southern Oregon College of Education, Ashland; Eastern Oregon College of Education, La Grande; Oregon College

of Education, Monmouth; Albany College of Portland, and Mt. Angel College.



MCNUTT DENIES PETITION ON OLEO STANDARDS

been advised that Federal Security Administrator Paul V. McNutt has denied the petition of the United Dairy committee for a rehearing on the new standard of identity for oleomargarine which became effective last Sept. 5. Oregon dairymen had signed the petitions, which came from all parts of the country.

McNutt said, in effect, that the public interest is better served under the new standards than under the old. Dairymen's chief objection is that the new standards permit sale of oleo colored as butter.

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
