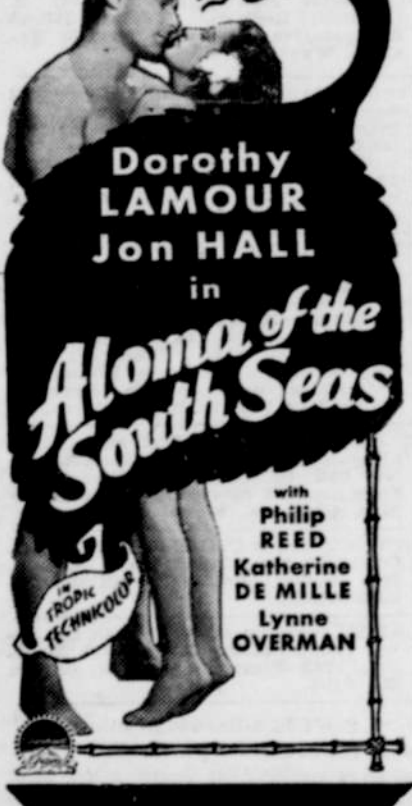

McNUTT DENIES PETITION ON OLEO STANDARDS
Dairy leaders of the state have been advised that Federal Security Administrator Paul V. McNutt has denied the petition of the United Dairy committee for a re-hearing on the new standard of identity for oleomargarine which became effective last Sept. 5. Oregon dairymen had signed the petitions, which came from all parts of the country.
McNutt said, in effect, that the public interest is better served under the new standards than under the old. Dairymen's chief objection is that the new standards permit sale of oleo colored as butter.
