Mrs. B. C. Forsythe and Mrs. O. G. Crawford were overnight visitors in Klamath Falls, going over Thursday and returning today.

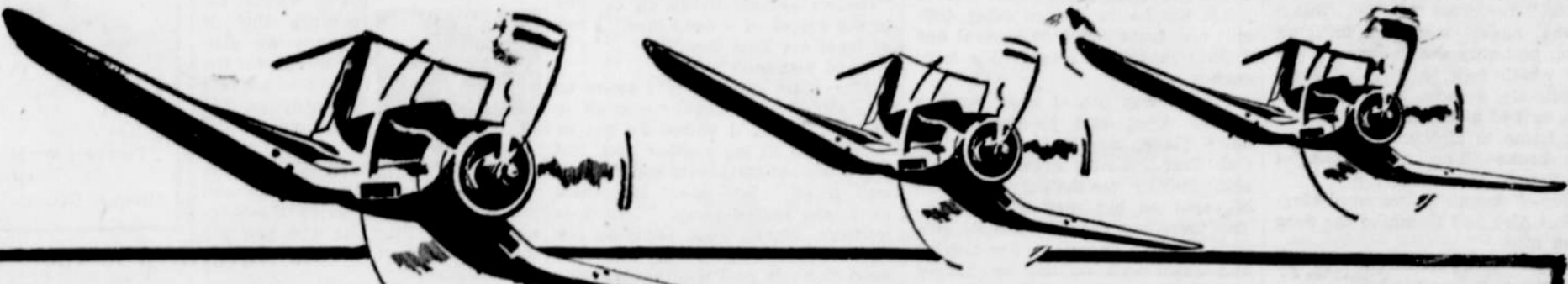

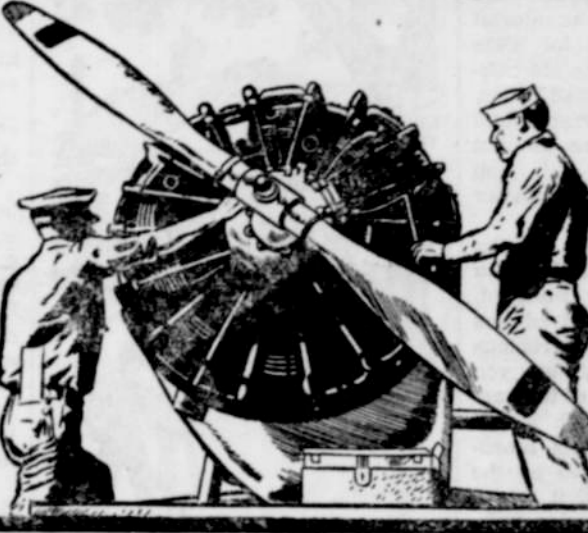

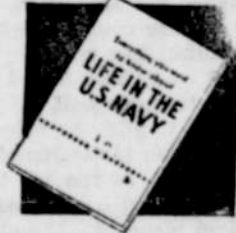
