FARMERS ASKED

to participate in the nationwide campaign for the collection of scrap iron and stell to aid the defense program. Farms of the United States are considered one of the most important sources of scrap supplies, which now are urgently needed for use by steel manufacturers for combining with pig iron.

Robert B. Taylor of Adams, chairman of the Oregon USDA defense board, is asking the cooperation of all county boards in carrying on a drive for the collecof scrap iron in connection with the current campaign to see that usable machinery is repaired early for use next year.

A graduated scale of prices for farm scrap throughout the United States, based on distance from consuming centers, has been set up so that farmers will know approximately what they will receive for their material at the various assembling points. 
