A. service and choir practice Priorities for Farm Machinery Received

A detailed list of materials allocations for manufacture of all types of farm machinery and equipment during the coming year has been received by Robert B. Taylor, Adams, chairman of the Oregon USDA defense board. The list, based on the OPM order restricting materials for manufacture of new machinery to 83 per cent of the 1940 figure, and materials for parts to 150 percent, will be available at county USDA defense board offices.

The program set up by OPM further emphasizes the need of prompt ordering of parts and necessary new equipment on the part of farmers, Taylor said, Distribution of what new equipment that is made will probably be on the basis of demand and need, and it is up to farmers to express their needs by ordering now, he advised.
