TROUT SEASON **OPENS APRIL 18**

The state game commission, at a meeting held Jan. 10, set the general season for trout six inches or over in length in 1942 from April 18 to Oct. 31, with the exception of 12 eastern Oregon counties where the season will extend from May 2 to Oct. 31. These counties are Baker, Gilliam, Un-Grant, Harney, Klamath. Lake, Morrow, Umatilla, Wallowa, Wheeler and Malheur.

The daily bag limit remains the same as before, 15 pounds and one fish but not to exceed 15 fish in any one day. The limit for any seven consecutive days or in possession at any one time is 30 pounds and two fish but not to exceed 30 fish:

From Nov. 1 to April 17 anglers will be permitted to take trout over 10 inches in length only in those waters open to steelhead and The aggregate salmon fishing. bag limit for steelhead, salmon and trout over 10 inches in length during this period will be three in one day with a possession limit of six and weekly limit of 10.

However, during the general open season for six-inch trout the regular daily bag limit of three salmon and steelhead over 20 inches in length may be counted separately and steelhead over inches in length may be counted separatelly from the trout limit. Special regulations prevail on the Rogue river and are essentially the same as last year.

Changes in black bass regulations include the establishment of a minimum length limit of eight inches and a closed season during May and June to protect the spawning fish. Also, the separate bag limit for bass is eliminated and bass are included in the general bag limit for spiny-rayed fish, which is 30 in any one day of all species combined or in possession at any one time.

No bullfrogs under four inches in body length may be taken. The season will be open from June 1 to Aprill 15 of the following year with the exception that in counties east of the Cascades the season will not open until July 1.

A daily bag limit of five fish will be effective for striped bass. In addition to the present bag limit of three for sturgeon under four feet in length, the limit for sturgeon over four feet in length is to be two.

Radio "Hams" Sought For Naval Service

According to an announcement from the office of Lieut. Glenn F DeGrave, officer in charge of navy recruiting in this district, the navy is searching for 5,000 radio hams and amateur operators for enlistment in the new RADAR division. Accepted applicants will be used as operators and maintenance men for submarine listening devices and aircraft

RADAR men will be enlisted as petty officers with the rating of radiomen second class with of \$72 a month plus allowances for food, uniforms and \$34.50 lodging. monthly for dependants.

Upon successful completion of a to eight months training course, graduates will be rated as high as chief radioman.

The new classification is open high school graduates with class A or B amateur operator licenses. Also required is experience in the repair, design and construction of transmitting and receiving equipment, or work in the field of television or cathode ray

Lieutenant DeGrave pointed out that RADAR presents unusual advantages to qualified men, such as the opportunity to enlist as a petty officer for the duration of the war and the chance for highly technical training in a specialized field which can be used to very good advantage to obtain immediate employment after discharge from the service.
