HINDSIGHT ON SPORTS

Jean Eberhart, Sons hoop coach, brought an interesting subject to light last week when explaining his "crow's nest" refereeing plan to this department.

Jean thinks it would be a good idea to improve the game if the rule requiring substitutes to report to referees were abolished. Often a player will forget to report to the referee and many games are won or lost on this unnecessary technicality. All records for a basketball game are kept at the timekeeper's table and it is not necessary for a player to tell the referee in whose place he is entering the game. In most cases, when a player does report and says he is going in for so-and-so, the official tells him to go ahead without even bothering to see that the proper player leaves the floor. In the event of a substitution during a time out, the referee doesn't usually even go to the team's huddle and advise them of the substitution but lets the player coming into the game do that. In a recent Medford-Roseburg game at Medford, the score was tied and Medford made a substitution. The player, in all the excitement, failed to report to the referee and Roseburg was given a technical free throw which helped in the winning of the game.

Since reporting to the referee makes no difference and is just a formality, it just doesn't look right that a ball game should be won or lost on such a mere technicality.
