#### HINDSIGHT ON SPORTS

Jean Eberhart, Sons hoop coach, brought an interesting subject to light last week when explaining "crow's nest" refereeing plan

to this department. Jean thinks it would be a good idea to improve the game if the rule requiring substitutes to report to referees were abolished. Often a player will forget to report to the referee and many games are won or lost on this unnecessary technicality. All records for a basketball game are kept at the timekeeper's table and it is not necessary for a player to tell the referee in whose place he is entering the game. In most cases, when a player does report and says he is going in for so-an-so, the official tells him to go ahead without even bothering to see that th proper player leaves the floor. In the event of a substitution dur-ing a time out, the referee doesn't usually even go to the team's huddle and advise them of the substitution but lets the player coming into the game do that. In a recent Medford-Roseburg game at Medford, the score was tied and Medford made a substitution. The player, in all the excitement, failed to report to the referee and Roseburg was given a technical free throw which helped in the winning of the game.

Since reporting to the referee makes no difference and is just a formality, it just doesn't look right that a ball game should be won or lost on such a mere technicality.
