Baling Wire Salvage Is Wartime Advice

American farmers throw away enough used baling wire each year to build three battleships or 3000 medium sized tanks, according to an estimate of the U. S. department of agriculture. Much of the 100,000 tons of baling wire used each year is allowed to rust away in scrap heaps after being used once.

Extension services in various states are now calling attention to the fact that much of this wire could be reclaimed and used a second time if carefully removed, either by untying the knot with pliers or by cutting the wire close to the knot. Rusting may be prevented by wiping or spraying the wire with oil and storing in a dry place.

Careful removal of wire from bales will also reduce stock losses, as many cattle and horses are killed annually by swallowing short pieces that become mixed with hay.

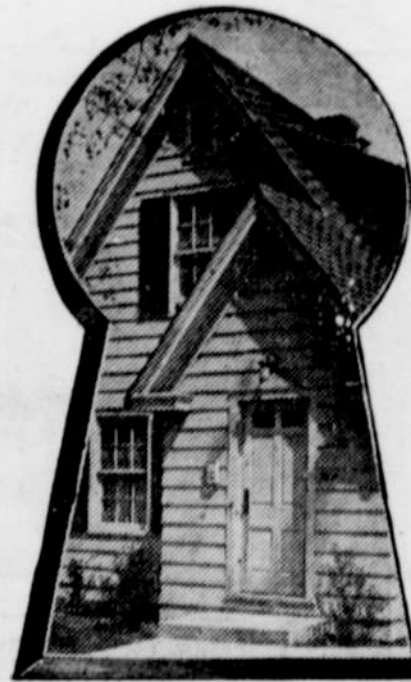
