INSPECTION FIRST STEP IN MILK SALE

Dairymen who expect to sell milk to either of the army cantonments in this state are advised that the first step they should take to get in line for the army pools is to call the nearest county agent, asking for inspection. The county agent will relay the request to the state department of agriculture, whose district men will make the inspection.

Upon basis of report from this inspection, dairymen can ascertain what, if any, the cost will be to get their plant in shape to meet the requirements. How much the dairymen will receive for their milk sold to the army pool (which will be entirely separate from the civilian pool) will depend upon results of hearings conducted by the milk control board.

Incidentally, only grade A pasteurized milk will be used at the cantonments.
