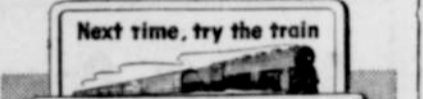

## Hearing Scheduled On Cherry Container

Shall Oregon cherry growers be granted use of an additional standard container in which to sell their fruit? There has been some request for a small display lug for cherries—3 3/4 inches deep, 10 1/2 inches wide and 15 inches long with a half-inch cleat at the top of each end.

Whether or not this box shall be made a standard container will be determined on basis of a hearing which the state department of agriculture has called for Wednesday, March 25, at 2 p. m. at its shipping point office in Milton. Persons who cannot attend the hearing may express their views in writing to the Plant Division, State Department of Agriculture, Salem.

## HINDSIGHT ON SPORTS

If some of the upstate baseball teams have their way, maybe Medford and Klamath Falls won't be granted a renewal of their franchise for the Oregon State baseball league this coming season.

At a recent meeting in Portland their entry was vigorously protested by Albany, Silverton and Hillsboro who claimed it would be too far to travel. They blamed the tire shortage and possible rationing of gasoline as the reason.

It seems to us it would be a good idea to form a northern division and a southern division. Portland, Albany, Silverton and Hillsboro could combine to form the northern division with Eugene, Bend, Klamath Falls and Medford making up the southern end. Each division could play their scheduled season and at the end the two champions could meet for the play-off and determine the State League champion. The plan would work much the same as the Pacific coast basketball conference.

If four teams would not make up a satisfactory schedule, outside teams could be booked for exhibition games. For an example, the southern division could book games with Dorris, Yreka, Dunsmuir and other northern California clubs while the northern division members could probably find opposition among small clubs in their locality.

Something will have to be worked out this month or the Medford Craters' park will be devoted to growing of weeds this summer and southern Oregon fans will have to get their baseball via radio.

## What Should You Save To Help?

WASHINGTON, D. C.—The following table issued by the Treasury Department is intended as a savings yardstick for the average income-earner. It suggests how everyone of the 48,000,000 employed persons in the United States may participate in the war effort through the systematic purchase of Defense Savings Bonds.

"The job ahead of us is far bigger than most of us realize," Secretary Morgenthau declared in making the table public. "I know that the American people are ready to do their part to win the war. One of the ways we can do much more is by intensifying our effort in the purchase of Defense Bonds."

While persons without dependents may be able to set aside more than the suggested figures, persons with several dependents, or with other heavy family obligations, may be unable to save at the suggested rate, the Treasury Department pointed out.
