### Looker's Fedora in Ring for Senate Seat

Walter J. Looker, Jackson county attorney, who has announced his candidacy for the republican nomination for state senator, was an Ashland visitor Wednesday looking over the situation in this end of the county.

In stating his qualifications, Looker stated that he received his early education in Sioux City, Iowa. He worked his way through college by shorthand reporting, in which he had specialized, and his skill in this art has been useful in many instances since.

Among his activities after leaving college, he recites the following: Chief clerk for the American Railway Express company; secretary to the president of the Livestock National Bank of Sioux City for three years; a civil service position with the Interstate Commerce Commission at Washington, D. C. for eight years, a hitch in the navy during World War I, coming west a few years later to operate a dairy ranch and apple orchard in the Yakima valley until 1925, when he came to Medford. Was admitted to the Oregon Bar in 1926 and was associated with A. E. Reames in practice of law and acting as court reporter. Now engaged in private law practice.
