



The country can no longer afford to have young men proceed with their education at a moderate tempo. Extra curriculum activities not specifically directed toward physical or mental preparation for participation in the war effort can no longer be encouraged. In war times receration in college life must be limited to that necessary for a healthy and well-rounded existence. In other words, the colleges in war time must be places of intensive effort and accomplish-ment.
